## 2 Delete or Deactivate Your Online Shopping Accounts

But, every time you've purchased a product or service from one of these sites, **you've needed to create an account, input a mailing address, and most importantly, add your financial information.** That is a lot of data to have stored online.

Similar to deleting your social media accounts, **all you need to do is find the account settings** on each shopping website and **choose to delete or deactivate your account,** thus removing all your information with it.

If you wish to purchase products and services online in the future, you could **use cryptocurrencies such as Bitcoin.** Bitcoin is a **completely anonymous form of payment** which more companies are accepting due to their growing popularity.

## 3 Utilise Deseat.me

**Deseat.me is a great internet service** created by Swedish developers Willie Dahlbo and Linus Unneback. **This trusted service can take a look every website you've ever created an account with and either delete or unsubscribe you from it.** In this case, the best option would be to enlist the service to completely delete all traces of you.

## 4 Remove Yourself from Data Collection Sites

Data brokers are companies that exist purely to collect your online data. Basically, **they collect your data in any way they can** over the internet and **sell it to the highest bidder.** Typically, it's **large retail companies that buy your information** as they can use it to **send you personalized ads for targeted marketing.** For many, this is a massive invasion of privacy.

If you find your personal information on these collection sites such as [Spokeo](#) and [White Pages](#), **you can request to have it removed.** However, they like to make it as difficult and frustrating as possible by **devising a long, drawn-out process** that could involve archaic **methods such as faxing and filing physical paperwork.**

## 5 Remove Personal Info from All Google Websites

It is possible to **contact Google and ask them to remove your personal data from their affiliated websites.** This should only be done when it is **extremely sensitive information such as banking details or your Social Security Number** as the request comes in the form of a [Legal Request.](#)

## 6 Remove Your Info Directly from Websites

Deleting your data from websites is simple, or it's supposed to be. We can guarantee that there are a hundreds of websites you've signed up for over the years and don't use now. If so, then **you can have your information removed from the site by contacting the company directly** and requesting that your information be deleted.

**This does, however, involve sending messages, emails, and support requests, which can take some time** before your wish officially gets granted.

**The key to this method is to be nice.** We wouldn't recommend you go in all guns blazing and DEMAND THAT YOUR DATA BE DELETED.

## 7 Remove Outdated Search Results Through Google

If you Google your name or any information about you, there is a good chance that something will pop-up. Whether it's an old site you signed up to, an old email address you forgot about, pictures, or even your resume from when you applied to a job, **Google can help you remove this data.**

If you **submit the URL to which your information is on to Google,** they may be able to **update their servers and remove any redundant URLs,** meaning you will no longer be associated with the page.

Again, **we cannot be certain that you will have success in your efforts,** but it's worth trying.

## 8 Remove Your Email Accounts

Removing your email accounts is a must when deleting yourself from the internet and is one of the the most crucial steps in the process. There is no doubt your **email accounts hold an overwhelming amount of personal, private, and financial information.** These could come in the form of password resets, bank statements, order confirmations, birthday messages, the list goes on.

Simply, **sign into each and every account, find the account settings option and remove the account.** Doing this will ensure all your account information and emails are permanently removed. Just be sure to back up any important data you'll need for future reference.

## 9 Clear Your Browser's History, Cache, Passwords, Payment Methods, and Saved Addresses

This one is easy, though there may be a different process depending on the browser you use. To delete your **browsing history and cache,** you can **visit the history section of your browser and there will be the option to clear all.**

To remove **payment methods and saved addresses,** you can do so in your browser settings. However, **you may need to individually delete each one.**

## 10 Use a VPN to Remain Anonymous

From **encrypting your data, bypassing geo-restrictions, and changing your location there are many valuable reasons to get a VPN.**

In the context of removing your information from the internet, **a VPN maintains your online anonymity.** It does this by changing your IP address to whatever server you're connected to, and since your IP address is your device's identity, **you remain hidden from any websites you visit.**

Additionally, if you choose a **premium VPN service** such as [ExpressVPN](#), [NordVPN](#), or [CyberGhost VPN](#), your **activity logs and personal information aren't saved,** meaning you are completely anonymous.

## Getting Back Online

If you plan on using the internet after your great purge, **you will need to maintain your anonymity. Therefore, you must use a VPN to ensure you don't accidentally distribute any data unknowingly.**
